Beneficiary Advisory Council Purpose & Information




Beneficiary Advisory Council (BAC)

The BAC is a dedicated forum for **people with lived experience** of the Medicaid program. BAC members must include:

Current and/or former Medicaid enrollees

Family members of enrollees

Paid or unpaid caregivers of enrollees



States must publicly post the MAC and BAC annual report, bylaws, membership lists, member recruitment/selection processes, and meeting minutes and MUST submit an annual report of all BAC activities.

Medicaid Advisory Committee (MAC)

The MAC is a **diverse group of Medicaid stakeholders** with a wide range of perspectives and experiences. The MAC includes BAC members and at least one representative from each of these categories:

Clinical providers/ administrators

Participating plans/ state associations

Other state agencies as ex officio members

State, local, or community-based organizations

By July 10, 2027, 25% of MAC members must be from the BAC*

*In the final rule, CMS opted to phase in this requirement, providing that 10% of MAC members must also be members of the BAC for the period July 9, 2025, through July 9, 2026; 20% for the period July 10, 2026, through July 9, 2027; and 25% thereafter.



Meeting Requirements



The BAC must meet separately and in advance of MAC meetings.

This helps ensure that the perspective of those with lived experience informs the broader discussions.



The BAC and MAC must offer a variety of meeting participation options.

Can be in-person, virtual, or hybrid, but telephone dial-in is always required.



At least two MAC meetings per year must be public.

Meetings must include dedicated time for public comment.



The BAC and MAC must each meet once per quarter.

Meetings may be held off cycle as necessary.



Beneficiary Advisory Council: Why?

- In 2024, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS)
 established a requirement for all state Medicaid agencies to operate a
 Beneficiary Advisory Council (BAC).
- The BAC creates an opportunity to elevate member, family member and/or caregiver voice in advising AHCCCS directly on policy and program administration.

Stipend Process

- All BAC members are eligible to receive a monetary stipend in the amount of \$80 for their participation, per quarterly meeting.
 - BAC members can choose to opt out of receiving the stipend.
- BAC members who opt in to receive the stipend, must fill out an I-9 form (only once) and send to HRD@azahcccs.gov. A stipend email has already been sent out to the BAC members from Josue Bell.
- The stipend payment schedule will be provided to all BAC members soon.

State Medicaid Advisory Committee (SMAC)



State Medicaid Advisory Committee Purpose

- In 2024, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) established a requirement for all state Medicaid agencies to operate a Medicaid Advisory Committee (MACs).
- The SMAC includes representation from advocacy groups, providers, Managed Care Organizations (MCOs), other state agencies.

State Medicaid Advisory Committee Process

- SMAC meets quarterly on the second Wednesday of January, April, July, and October each year. The meetings are for two hours from 1-3 pm and always have a virtual component.
 - April and October SMAC meetings are hybrid.
- Open meeting law for SMAC only.
- At least two BAC members will need to serve on both the SMAC and BAC, per the 10% rule from CMS.
- SMAC webpage lists the names, titles, and orgs of members.

BAC Member SMAC Selection

- We are seeking two interested BACs member who would like to serve also on the SMAC. The meetings are for two hours from 1-3 pm and always have a virtual component.
- This will start on January 7, 2026.

- BAC members serving on the SMAC are eligible for a stipend per meeting.





Diving Into the BAC Governance Documents



What is a Charter and Why It Matters

Before a council begins its work, it's important to establish a clear foundation. A **charter** is a key tool that ensures everyone involved understands the purpose, scope, and structure of the group. It sets the tone for how the work will be carried out and provides a shared understanding from the start.

- A charter defines the foundation and framework for a council's efforts
- Clarifies purpose, expectations, scope, and authority
- Aligns all members on roles, responsibilities, and shared goals
- Serves as a reference point throughout the project lifecycle
- Promotes transparency and stakeholder engagement

What Are Bylaws and Why They Matter

- Bylaws are the internal rules and procedures adopted by a committee or council, to govern its operations.
- Bylaws act as a framework for how a group is run and ensures consistency, accountability, and compliance.
- Bylaws help to establish roles and responsibilities, meeting and quorum requirements, procedures for decision-making/voting, and other related processes.
- Our community partner has drafted the BAC bylaws and we are now seeking your input on finalizing the document.
- Desiree will send the draft version of the BAC bylaws via email and it will be something we work through together at a future meeting.
